Many will recall the fabulous Beacon Lighting evenings which in 2018 marked the 100th Anniversary of the end of the WW1 and in 2022

the Queen's Jubilee. This year there will be another National Beacon Lighting event, this time to commemorate D-Day. The evening will commence with Bell Ringing at 6.30 pm followed



by Scottish Pipers and a Buglar, before the Nation's Tribute is read and the Beacon lit at 9.15 pm. All of the activities will happen in the vicinity of St Barnabas Church, the Chequers and the Old Playing Field. National Fish and Chips day this year had been moved to the 6th so that it can be incorporated in celebrations as it was such an important meal for servicemen others in 1944. The Chequers will therefore kindly be offering that dish over the course of the evening.

NEWS FROM GREAT TEY NEIGHBOUR-HOOD PLAN GROUP

Planning Application 231153 Land off New Barn Road

This planning application was considered by Colchester City Council planning committee on 30 November 2023. The chair of the Neighbourhood Plan Group attended the meeting and gave a presentation to the committee, asking them to reconsider the layout of the proposed development and to move a number of properties away from the boundary with existing dwellings. Regrettably this request was not accepted and the plans were approved by the committee. We will continue to liaise with the developers to ensure that the new dwellings are sympathetic with neighbouring properties.

Call for Sites and Roman River Corridor Proposal

As part of the review of their Local Plan, Colchester City Council issued a call for sites for development and green spaces, which ended on 5th January. The parish councils of Aldham, Great Tey and Marks/Little Tey have submitted proposals to protect the Roman River Corridor as a designated green space. The Neighbourhood Plan group has endorsed this proposal as it addresses many of the aspirations of the community expressed during our consultation process, specifically maintaining surrounding countryside and protection of wildlife habitats.

Update on the draft Neighbourhood Plan

The draft plan has now been passed to Colchester City Council planning department. It is subject to review by a planning inspector, after which there will be a further public consultation. We will advise the community when the consultation period is scheduled.

GREAT TEY BELL RINGERS

Now that a shiny new 2024 is upon us, it's a nice time to review what the St Barnabas ringers got up to in 2023. And what a year it was. At a time when many bell-towers are struggling for manpower, we now have twenty five ringing members of the Essex Association at Great Tey.

The enthusiasm of our community band, coupled with their technical progress, is widely acknowledged in the ringing community. Four of our ringers attended the Essex training courses in April as students, with another four helping as instructors. This continued improvement in skills meant that in 2023 we were able to ring all 8 of our bells for church services, for the first time in many decades.

Our band was able to demonstrate this by ringing for the Coronation in May, both for the event itself, as well as a special Quarter Peal, an involved sequence of memorised ringing changes taking 45 minutes to complete. This is a recognised achievement and is only the second time this has happened with a Great Tey band since the 1980s. Just to show it wasn't just a one off, we rang two more quarter peals in October, allowing our youngest ringers to show off their skills.

Ringing is a team effort, with everybody responsible for sounding their one note out of the eight at the right time. Regular competitions are held to judge the accuracy of the striking of the bells from different bands and we were able to put up three teams into the county competitions this year. Whilst we didn't win, we performed commendably well, particularly given the relative inexperience of our band.

The long ropes in our tower can make our bells seem quite challenging, so it is a tribute to the growing profile of the band that we now see visiting ringers from outside of the area. Ringing is a national hobby, and one of the joys is to be able to ring the bells in a historic location that is new to you. In September we organised a Great Tey road trip to the churches in the Southend area, where our gang turned up en masse to ring bells in five different towers. With the inevitable pub lunch, of course.

We hold two practices each week, on Tuesday evenings and on Saturday mornings. You might be unaware of the Saturday practices, because we have installed a system to allow us to ring the bells virtually silently at times. Whilst it's not quite the same as normal ringing, it allows us to hone our skills whilst taking our neighbours into consideration. We also use the silencers for the first part of our Tuesday practice, which allows us to warm up in private. However, nothing compares to the sound of the real thing!

Talking of Tuesdays, we are very grateful to Terry and Natalie at the Chequers for opening the pub for us after our Tuesday practice sessions. We try to pay back the favour by bringing increasing numbers into the pub and it's good to see that other villagers are using the pub on Tuesdays as well.

At the end of 2023 we held our annual Christmas dinner at, (where else?) The Chequers. Twenty eight of us sat down to a great meal and were provided with some mini-bells for us to have a play with. Ringing is a social hobby, and it's good to see that some of the well known faces in the village are now part of the band.

We have great plans for 2024. Apart from the normal ringing for church services, we are also planning to have a special service to bless the bells on Sunday 12th May. Did you know that the patron Saint of bell ringing is St Dunstable? No, neither did I. You can also expect us to have a significant surprise in store for the village weekend.

So thank you to everybody for your support in 2023. You are part of something that is widely recognised as an ongoing success story from Great Tey. And if you fancy finding out about what we do, come and see us on a Tuesday or contact us via the pub. We even have our own Facebook page - Great Tey Bell Ringers. You can learn how to operate 400 year old machinery, as well as making a noise that can be heard miles away. What could be better?

church tower glows amber in early morning light watercolour skies shift blue-grey then-pearl

We take the path between two houses wind from the northwest turns up our collars pond and ditch reflect the winter sun

footprints leave their marks on crossfield pathways dog stops to sniff and snout at every step

sluiced of colour fields lie dun and fallow bushy trees stripped back to pewter-grey and green smudges of brown identify the hazels

spiky hedgerows shake and stretch in the thin Febuary air catkins loose their pollen to the wind

Pattock's Farmhouse windows look out on fresh-turned furrows gleaming from the plough

hawthorn and hazel hedges flayed and split their shorn growth shredded all over the road how do they survive this winter mauling

in Bacon's Lane the sheep dog who'd come bounding from the yard is silent now

half-buried boulders mossed with age strew the rail embankment and soon the looming viaduct

alders crowd the winding boardwalk their knobby blackened fruits hard with age bob in the freshened breeze

by the river unprotected gardens to the water's edge last November the stream swept caramel and surging to just below the bridge

vans run briskly on the Halstead road as we turn for home they're planting up the garden of the house that's all but finished now bow-fronted portico railed balcony to take its place in village life again

at the fishing lake olive-clad angler merges with the foliage

here in this hollow fallen branches clog the sunken track underfoot sweet chestnut leaves colour drained and curling line our route

ivy and bramble the greenest things in copse or hedgerow their shrunk black fruits among the mottled fingers

colonising shaded ditch and bank dog's mercury and arum unfurl their leaves to join the ferns

it's spring we are expecting in the chilled light air as are the birds that call and claim their patch of this disputed territory

now the mid-morning light is flat and dull as we turn up paths and driveways to shake off muddied boots and turn the key

GARDENING NOTES February 2024

Making use of difficult gardening days! Checking out winter flowering plants


Just to add to the tricky autumn weather – the garden soggy and damp and raining dripping down the neck, it has now gone from a swamp to a very cold, rock hard frosted wilderness! So time to stay indoors and think about the shrubs I might have planted which would have cheered me up on a dreary winters day.

I have been looking at some newer varieties of plants that I have had in the garden for many years. These winter flowers have served me well, but it always good to see if there are newer varieties/cultivars that would be better or different.

Take for instance mahonia. I would always recommend this easy evergreen shrub with sweet scented winter yellow flowers. I have Mahonia Japonica in my garden. It makes a large-ish free flowering, very tolerant plant that will flourish in sun or shade. It doesn't mind being cut back quite vigorously to keep it the size I want. However, in recent years there have been improved cultivars. Mahonia Charity is smaller and a bit less vigorous and a 'good doer'! Now there is an even better type for a small garden called Winter Sun, more compact still and with larger, brighter flowers.

I am not a big fan of grasses in my border. I tend to think they look half dead by the end of the summer and as if I had forgotten to weed them out! However, I visited a friend the other day, who has four free standing, stately clumps of Miscanthus growing all alone in holes in her paving round a pond. They are about 8 foot tall and quite magnificent even if rather brown! Looking around this summer, I see that there is a new cultivar of this grass called Miscanthus Silver Charm. It is spectacular, its tall fluffy flower heads have a silver sheen in the summer, going progressively whiter as the season draws on. You could also grow it in a large pot too and it would look very handsome – I am almost won over!

I grow a winter flowering clematis scrambling through my wisteria on the front of the house. I am not sure why as it isn't very distinguished! It has rather drab whitish flowers speckled with rather dreary dull purplish spots. It's one virtue being that it is evergreen and scrambles up the bare branches of the wisteria and adds a little bit of colour. It is called clematis cirrhosa. I have just seen a much prettier cultivar called Clematis Cirrhosa



Landsdown Gem. It looks to be an attractive shade of reddish purple. If anyone grows it and finds it as attractive as it sounds, do let me know.

One last suggestion of a shrub that I would definitely have in my garden if I could. It is not that it is a new variety but when planting shrubs in the garden I did not know about it and now have no room! It has a very unmemorable name, but it has all the virtues. Its name is Viburnum plicatum Tomentosum Mariesii. There are lots of viburnum varieties but this is very special. It has beautiful lace cap flowers in late winter, berries in autumn and excellent autumn colour. Best of all it grows as if in layers. It is difficult to do it justice in words. Look out for it in the flesh or Google it and if you have room for one big shrub this would be an excellent choice.

Epiphanytide

We have just enjoyed the season of the **Epiphany**. This strange word is a direct translation from Greek *epiphaneia*, "manifestation". Epiphany was traditionally celebrated on January 6th, commemorating the first 'manifestation' of Jesus to the Gentiles, represented by the Magi or the Three Kings.

Many myths have grown up around the 'Three Kings from Persian Lands'. It is worth 'googling' them to learn more. They are often called 'Magi' The term refers to the Persian priestly caste of Zoroastrianism. As part of their religion, these priests paid particular attention to the stars and gained an international reputation for astrology, which was at that time highly regarded as a science. Their religious practices and use of astrology caused derivatives of the term Magi to be applied to the occult in general and led to the English term magic.

Candlemas

Traditionally, Candlemas was celebrated on the 2nd of February and marked the time when Jesus was presented to the congregation in the Temple. It became associated with the lighting of lots of candles, because it had been prophesied that Jesus was to be the 'Light of the World'. Many countries have traditions associated with Candlemas, including the French who used to celebrate by making pancakes.

It was also thought to be the end of the Christmas season. Durham Cathedral, for example, still doesn't take its Christmas tree down until Candlemas.

Christmas Flowers/wreaths in the churchyard

We would be grateful if everyone who has placed wreaths on graves at Christmas would remove them in the next week or so. The exception to the guidance

which discourages plastic flowers in the churchyard, makes an exception for wreaths at Christmas time, with the proviso that they will be removed once the Christmas season is over. We will be tidying up the churchyard early in February. Any wreaths still on graves by then will be put in the porch for the owners to collect. Thank you for your help.
