HERITAGE SIGNPOST – Junction of The Street and Coggeshall Road – *HELP NEEDED*

Your help is needed in trying to track down the missing pieces of the Heritage signpost at the bottom of the Street on the junction with the Coggeshall Road. This signpost, made of cast iron and manufactured in the 1920's by Stanton's of Derby, is one of only a very small number of heritage signposts remaining in the Colchester area. fact, it is designated



as a "monument" on the Colchester Heritage website – number MC5560.

The sign originally had 3 arms signposting Coggeshall, Colchester and Earls Colne with a decorative circular section finial on the top reading "Essex County Council". The circular section has been missing from the signpost for over a year and sadly, in the last month, the arm signposting Colchester has also disappeared possibly after being damaged. Despite a search of the undergrowth and fields in the surrounding area the pieces have not been found.

The Parish council are really keen to retain this heritage monument so, if you have any information as to the whereabouts of the missing pieces, please let us know either by email at Greatteyparishcouncil@outlook.com or drop us a note into the post box at the Village Hall.

It would be such a shame to lose this historical asset and find that it is replaced with a modern wooden alternative.

Colchester City Council is currently consulting on the Submission version of the Neighbourhood Plan for Great Tey. The Great Tey Neighbourhood Plan sets out the planning framework about how Great Tey residents and businesses would like the parish to develop up to the year 2033.

Before the Neighbourhood Plan can proceed to examination, Colchester City Council is required to consult on the final version of the document (Submission) to satisfy Part 5 Regulation 16 of The Neighbourhood Planning (General) Regulations 2012.

If the Neighbourhood Plan passes the Examination, it can then progress to the Referendum stage.

GREAT TEY BELL RINGERS

Next time you're listening to the bells, give some thought to how they got up that tower in the first place.

Six of our bells are over 200 years old, with the oldest bell (No 7) dating back to 1627. No lorries or cranes then, so how did they do it?

The answer for our oldest bells, is that they made them on site. A large hole was dug in the church grounds and a clay mould was made in the shape of the bell. The mould was made in two parts and finished off with fine sand,

before the parts were clamped together. Ingots of bell metal, which is a type of bronze, were melted in a furnace and poured into the mould to cast the bell. Sounds simple? Well, it wasn't.

Imagine how much charcoal you would need to melt 3/4 ton of bronze in a clay oven that you have built yourself, in the open air. That assumes you have



access to high quality copper and tin, of course.

Even today, casting metal is dangerous and complex, but somehow, in 1627, Miles Graye of Colchester managed it successfully. He then had to clean up the rough casting using hammer and chisel (no power tools back then) and tune the bell by chipping off small fragments, bit at a time.

To get the bell up the tower, they had to remove the louvres in the bellfry and hoist it up there with ropes, block and tackle, using only muscle power.

All that effort, just to create a bell for the good people of Great Tey.

Nearly 400 years later, that bell rings twice a week, as good as the day it was first made.

Makes you think, doesn't it?

This is an opportunity for residents to help increase road safety in our village. A visable presence helps encourage drivers to slow down and monitor their speed.



GARDENING NOTES March 2024

Spring and other things

Well done those who came and planted another 2,000 snowdrops along the Street on Saturday. They will join those which have been flowering bravely opposite the entrance to Greenfield Drive. Some of the planters were a little downhearted because it appeared that those planted the year before last on the bank, had not to have fared so well. Things don't always go according to plan. In this case, the season after planting was probably very dry, which snowdrops don't like very much. The bank may have been cut a little bit too soon after planting. Maybe we didn't plant them quite deep enough. The good news is that some will have survived and next year we can go back and plant some more. In the end we will get there!

This reminds me that snowdrops don't mind a bit of dampness. I have some close to the horsed pond here at Bucklers which are regularly flooded these days and still pop up each spring. If you want to spread any clumps that you may have, now is the time to do it. Lift a clump carefully and tease it apart and replant about 5 or 6 bulbs at a time. You will have a good show in no time.

Talking of spring tasks, I wanted to have a word about dahlias. As I was walking round the garden centre the other day, I couldn't help noticing that there were literally dozens of packets of dahlias in all sorts of colours, shapes and sizes. It reminded me of just how much times change. When I was young, even quite modest houses in villages, had reasonable sized gardens, not the pocket-sized plots new houses have now. Every garden, as well as being full of vegetables would, inevitably, have a row of splendid, large dahlias. These would be religiously dug up in autumn and dried off, 'dusted with sulphur' according to Percy Thower's instructions and stored until spring when they would be planted back in the garden in May. Most of those dahlias would have been swapped or acquired from neighbours and friends. Garden Centres didn't exist. Then fashion changed and no one wanted them anyway!

How different now. They are back in fashion and available everywhere. Climate change means that many of us leave our dahlias in the



ground over winter - I do. An extra covering of bark or straw or compost is usually enough to keep them safe. However, if you do lift them, now is the time to put them in a pot with any sort of compost – multi purpose or John Innes. Water them well and this will give them a head start when you plant them out in a couple of months. If you really want to be ahead of the game and save yourself some money, you can take cuttings as the plants begin to grow. Look on line for instructions as to how to do this. Monty Don has shown us on several occasions. Certainly worth a go.

One other thing struck me as I walked round the garden centre. The breeders of the plants we buy every year, seem to produce them with bigger and bigger, brighter and brighter flowers. Primulas and primroses, pansies and hellebores, seem to me less attractive when they are positively luminous and almost deformed by being so large. However gems can be found – I found an unnamed subtle pink hellebore with small pointed petals – charming, so keep your eyes peeled!

'Maundy' - What does it mean?

Maundy Thursday or Holy Thursday is the day during Holy Week that commemorates the Washing of the Feet and Last Supper of Jesus Christ with the Apostles, but why 'Maundy'?

As is so often the case, the origin of the title is obscure. Some say it is derived from 'mandatum' the Latin for commandment referring to 'the commandment to love one another'.

Rather more likely is that Maundy is derived from the Old French mendier, and Old English maund, to beg. This refers to the habit of kings giving arms on this day to those who begged.

'Good Friday' - Why Good?

It seems odd to describe the day on which Christ was killed in the most unpleasant way as 'Good'.

Once again the title refers to a meaning of 'good' that we no longer use very often. In former times one of the meanings of good was in fact 'holy'. 'Good Friday' comes from the obsolete sense 'pious, holy' of the word "good". Less common examples of expressions

based on this obsolete sense of "good" include "the good book" for the Bible.

EGGS!

Why do we eat chocolate eggs at Easter? In times gone by, before the arrival of chocolate to our shores it was real eggs that we ate to celebrate Easter Sunday.

This custom of the Easter egg, according to many sources, can be traced to early Christians of Mesopotamia, and from there it spread into Eastern EuropeandSiberiathroughtheOrthodoxChurches,and later into Europe through the Catholic and Protestant Churches. Other sources maintain that the custom arose in western Europe during the Middle Ages as a result of the fact that Western Christians were prohibited from eating eggs during Lent, but were allowed to eat them when Easter arrived.

Wherever the custom came from, the habit of colouring or painting eggs goes back millennia, long before Christ was born and Christians adopted the whole 'egg thing' as an excellent metaphor for 'rebirth' – the essence of the message of Easter Sunday.

So, enjoy those eggs and join us to celebrate the day on Sunday the 31st of March at 10am in Great Tey church and 6.30 at Little Tey Church and there may even be an egg on the way out, albeit a very small one!
